Architectural walking tour

Following the very well-attended Blacket Association historical and architectural walking tour of the Blackets in May last year, we will be running it again at 6:30pm on Wednesday 8 May. This will draw on the architectural trail guide of the Blackets (written some years ago and revised by the Association in 2018) supplemented by personal research by the two guides, Richard Scothorne and Hugh Mackay.

The tour will start at the Dalkeith Road entrance to Blacket Place. It's estimated to last about 90 minutes. All are most welcome.

Open gardens

PARKING ACTION PLAN

The Council has recently circulated a consultation paper TRO/19/29 on their city-wide Parking Action Plan. From Blacket residents' perspective, the most important issues are the introduction of shared-use parking places and residents' visitors permits. The Blacket Association has been pressing for these changes for many years and we therefore have welcomed the proposals in TRO/19/29.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Since the AGM, there have been fewer reports of criminal or anti-social behaviour affecting the Blacket Area. Unfortunately, however, at the beginning of March, there was an

outbreak of graffiti, which affected three properties in the area. These were reported to the police, and the Blacket Association issued an alert and provided information about responsibilities for the removal of graffiti from property.

As summer approaches and garden equipment emerges from sheds and garages, we should keep vigilant about leaving unattended equipment in view and about securing sheds afterwards. Similarly, windows and doors, opened for ventilation, should be shut and bolted at the end of what we hope will be long sunny summer days. If you see anything suspicious, contact the police.

BLACKET SHRUBBERY REPORT

Since the last newsletter, we have pruned the bases of the lime trees, maintained and watered young trees and bushes, weeded and cleared litter and builders' waste. It is a shame that the daffodil season was not more colourful, but the tree canopy blocks out much of the sun and rain. Periwinkle (*Vinca*) is our most successful flowering plant. The main problem is ivy, which is climbing up trees, walls and fences – it has to be controlled. Initially, we saw it as good groundcover, but now it has become too successful! Therefore, ivy will be the target for the next working party. The request for volunteers will go out online. Litter is a common problem in the shrubbery and, unfortunately, the recent gas repairs have made matters worse. Some residents may think that the streets are cleaned by the local authority, but this is incorrect, although the Council may send a lorry occasionally. The Blacket committee does take up the topic of street cleaning with our Councillors and doubtless they do try to help, but nothing much seems to change.

Therefore, if we want the five streets to look good, we have to take individual action by sweeping our pavements and picking up the litter others have discarded. Why not keep a polybag in your pocket or bag, so it can be conveniently used to help collect any litter you spot.
